First Deaf Refugee Conference in Rochester, NY:

Wow! Just back (June 2019) from the first Deaf Refugee Conference to be held in the United States. It was a tribute to the work being done with those in need in various corners of our country for this doubly-isolated population. The conference was fantastically run by Deaf Refugee Advocacy and held at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf in Rochester, NY. Agencies serving Deaf refugees, health clinics, educators and advocates from around the US attended three days of heartfelt sharing.

All those attending were dedicated and skilled, mostly Deaf themselves and committed to this very important work. Three of our staff and four of those we work with attended and 'team-presented' about our work in the Greater Phila area. We were then treated to a final night performance by local Deaf immigrants and refugees. They acted out their various

journeys from oppression, isolation, hunger and war in their home countries and refugee camps, to their new lives in the US - leaving very few dry eyes in the house. Their journeys are still being made possible and much easier by the 100 plus volunteers at Deaf Refugee Advocacy who assist them with everything from food and shelter, learning American Sign Language, English and obtaining accessible healthcare. Perhaps most importantly, they were met here by Deaf people, much like them, who understood being isolated and shut out, but who had also learned how to 'come out', affirm their beauty, fight back and access the same opportunities that others had. Wow / PAH!!

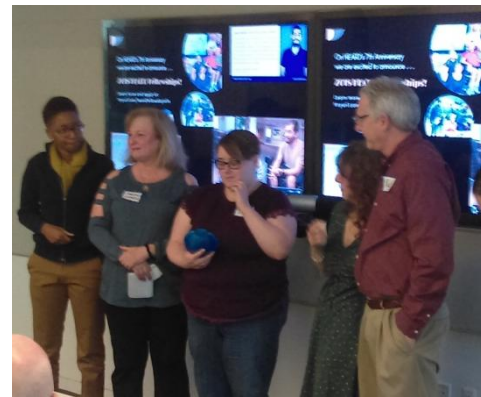
July 13 Ushers Syndrome Conference (vision & hearing loss)

With the help of HEARD (Helping Educate to Advance the Rights of Deaf Communities) and others, we drafted a Model of Accommodations (communication access, interpreters, ASL) and are working with and reaching out to the PA Dept of Corrections, Federal Bureau of Prisons, mental health forensic units and regional county jails to enhance conditions, while continuing our visits and advocacy for Deaf/hard of hearing inmates and returning citizens in this region.
